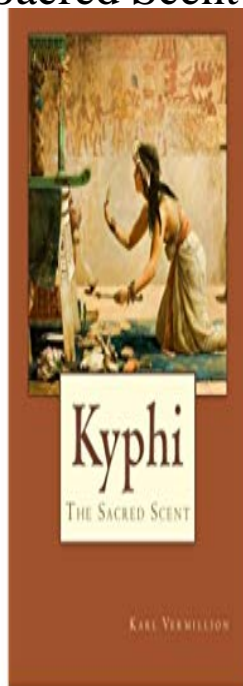


Kyphi: The Sacred Scent
